Breakthrough results on tuberculosis transmission, testing and treatment to be announced in two official live press conferences

Wednesday,13th October 2021 (Paris, France) –WHO Director-General Dr Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus and South African South African Minister for Health Mathume Joseph Phaahla will address the virtual 52nd Union World Conference on Lung Health (WCOLH) taking place next week October 19-22. The event takes place against the backdrop of ongoing COVID-19 vaccine inequity and with the pandemic continuing to the impact on the delivery of TB services in many low- and middle-income countries.

COVID-19 and tuberculosis are today the world's two leading infectious disease killers. The novel coronavirus pandemic has refocused attention on how infectious diseases transmit from person to person and has catalysed innovations in sampling and diagnostics. There has also been a renewed focus on zoonotic disease infection. The disruption to TB services during the pandemic has only highlighted just how important it will be going forward that testing for and treating TB are made simpler and easier to access.

Breakthrough data on tuberculosis transmission, zoonotic transmission, testing and treatment will be announced in two official live press conferences taking place Tuesday October 19, 09:30 CEST and Wednesday October 20, 10:30 CEST.
